

GCSE Photography visit to the Curwen Print Centre


GCSE students recently spent the day at the Curwen Print Centre in Cambridge. As an exam board criteria, the development of students' photographs is a key aspect of portfolio development.

Holidays

Absence during term time for holiday will not be authorised unless there are exceptional circumstances. Any absence in term time must be applied for in advance.

In addition, due to the importance of pupils settling into school at the commencement of the school year, Penalty Notices may also be issued if there have been at least six consecutive sessions of unauthorised absence during the first two weeks of September due to a term-time holiday. I must warn you that, if you do take your child out of school for this time, the absence will not be authorised and the local authority may issue a penalty notice to each parent of £120 for each child to be paid within 21 days, however if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, it is reduced to £60. Please note: if you have previously received a Penalty Notice for an offence of failing to ensure regular school attendance or been the subject of prosecution for any child in relation to irregular school attendance, you may not be given the opportunity to pay the further Penalty Notice; your case may proceed directly to court.

Please call the absence line **(02045396559)** before 9am every day your child is absent, leaving your child's **full name**, form and reason for the absence, this is part of the school's Attendance Policy. Alternatively you can notify the school via ParentMail or emailing <u>attendance@dlsbasildon.org</u> please **do not** use the <u>info@dlsbasildon.org</u> email.

Please ensure all your contact details are kept up to date.




Towngate Theatre

After about two and a half hours traversing the M25 and then the M1 with the usual welcome breaks thrown in, we pulled into Cadbury World to much cheers and giggles from the students

We headed straight to the reception desk and announced our arrival. While I facilitated the registration process, the students queued for tickets to enter the attraction. As I completed the admin formalities, I was presented with a pile of

chocolates as a token of appreciation for having chosen to visit Cadbury World. They were neatly packed to one side of the glass enclosure of the reception cubicle. We all agreed to tour the facility first before collecting the yummy treats that were waiting to remind us of how wonderful experiential learning tasted.

Our first stop on the tour was at a section simulated to look, feel and smell like a tropical rainforest where cocoa beans are grown. It felt damp and was replete with the sounds of animals that generally live in these locations.

We walked out of the forest and into a London Black Cab on rails that took us on a short tunnel trip into the history of Cadbury World. The walls of the tunnel were decorated with pictures and notes depicting different periods and events forming the backstory to this decades-old chocolate manufacturer.



The pathway is overseen by our Head of Child and Family Counselling Services, who is supported by a team that are both passionate about and dedicated to the wellbeing of children and young people. The team has achieved very positive and reparative outcomes for children and families.

After an initial contact, we will arrange an assessment to explore the issues your child may be experiencing and will then identify which model best supports the difficulty your child may be facing.

At the suggestion of my daughter's school a referral was made to **BCCS** and it was then that I met one of their counsellors. After months of unanswered questions and "hitting brick walls" I finally had answers, structure and a profound understanding of how a small little girl's mind works.

For me, there has been nothing so worrying as watching your child struggle and the **BCCS** counsellor's help has enabled me to help her for which I will be forever grateful.
