


Black History Month - October 2020


In English we have highlighted black authors in the library and included some in our teaching of poetry this month



Black Mathematicians - Year 7 designed the following posters in their Maths lessons.
















English Department

The beginning of this academic year has been a busy one for us. September was busy getting to know all of our lovely new Year 7s.

In October, we spent time looking into Black History.

With some of our Year 11s we looked at John Agard, an Afro-Guyanese playwright, poet and children's writer. With some of our Year 8's and 9's we looked at Langston Hughes who was an American poet, social activist, novelist and playwright. He was also one of the earliest innovators of jazz poetry.

We also created a display in the Library with some of our books about black history along with displays about some of the most notable people in black history.













Below is also a little quiz to test you on your black history writers – If you are the first to hand them to Miss Foster when we return, you will receive a prize.

- 1. This woman was a record breaker for her literature and women writers. She was a slave that learned to read and write from her masters, who also encouraged her to write poetry. Her work was praised by the British and Americans alike during the American Revolutionary War. She was also the first African American woman poet to publish a book. Who was she? Phillis Wheatley, Maya Angelou, Sojourner Truth or Alice Walker?
- 2. Several African Americans became famous for their autobiographies about their lives as slaves, including Frederick Douglass, who became a leading figure in the abolitionist movement True or False?
- 3. This woman is well known for her autobiographies and her poetry. She wrote "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings", which was the story of her life that brought her international attention. What is the pen name of Marguerite Ann Johnson? Is it Malorie Blackman or Maya Angelou?
- 4. Alice Walker won a Pulitzer Prize for her fiction work. What was the name of the novel Alice Walker wrote, that featured the life of a black woman who was abused by her father and husband? Was it, The Help, The Colour Purple, To Kill a Mockingbird or The Colour Black?
- 5. Ralph Ellison was a writer and publisher during World War II. He became well known for his writings on the topics of communism and black nationalism. What was Ralph Ellison's novel that was the story of an unnamed African man who could not be seen because people chose not to see him? Was it, The Invisible Man, Flying Home or Shadow and Act?

Christmas Book Recommendation

Season's greetings to everyone – and as I write this, I am very aware that the festive period will be very different for us all in 2020. Hopefully, we can still keep many traditions and customs – and being given a good book to read has always been part of that for me.

My recommendation this time is for older teenagers. 'The Giver' by Lois Lowry is the first in a series and is a Newberry Medal winner. It follows a boy called Jonas as he approaches adulthood. In his community, all children take part in a ceremony to celebrate transition. Jonas is to become a 'twelver' (he is 16) and about to learn what is planned for him by the Elders in his community. Training and careers are designated by the Elders in Jonas' society, not chosen by children and their carers. Anticipation turns to anxiety when his name isn't called in sequence – and then he learns what is planned for him...


Initially, Jonas' society seems idyllic; a Utopia. Landscapers manicure lawns and gardens, meals are delivered to each family and waste is collected afterwards. Older children are expected to do voluntary work in addition to their studies, and this is enjoyed by both students and recipients of their care. Families seem caring and close; children's feelings and dreams are listened to. This society seems one where pain, hunger and anxiety have been eradicated. But the only book in each house is 'The Book of Rules' and it is expected that each member of the community is aware of and abides by those rules.

When Jonas meets his mentor, the Receiver of Dreams, he is told that he has 'the capacity to see beyond' – a quality which can only be named, but never described. He slowly begins to understand what no one else is allowed to know. He understands what his community has lost – and what he needs. And with that realisation comes the need to take action...

Would you like more good news? There is a wonderful film version, too. Even more good news? The book is the first in a series, so there is more to come if you enjoy this!

I wish everyone a Merry Christmas, and hope you all manage to enjoy yourselves, despite the situation we find ourselves in. And here's to a very, very different year in 2021!





