to go on the Christmas Tree.














<u>Year 7 Welcome Mass and Commissioning of</u> Student Leadership Team

First of all, may I take this opportunity to wish everyone an incredibly Merry Christmas! Here's hoping that this year we can all spend time with loved ones — and can look forward to 2022.

My recommendation this term is 'Loser', by Paul Orton, a thriller aimed at 13-15 year-old boys — but I really enjoyed it! It is the first in a series, which attracted me; I read series of book like other people watch soap operas. It will appeal to those who aspire to use their IT knowledge either to cause mayhem, or to do some good. Because the protagonist, Ryan, is a hacker who delights in pitting his wits against the strongest cyber security imaginable. In this instance, the Ministry of Defence Secure system. Within minutes, (and this could sound predictable but it isn't) uninvited guests have arrived. And they don't bother ringing the doorbell, either.

Despite his youth, in the absence of his parents, Ryan is arrested, and finds himself in a very hostile environment, where it seems his skills are to both punished and fine-honed by specialists. In this way, the talents of Ryan and his fellow 'students' are to be monitored and also utilised.

I found Ryan's reactions fascinating throughout the novel, in terms of how his values adjust and respond to this new experience – and how he uses his intellect to outwit those who conspire against him and his new friends.

I loved this – strongly recommend it. Can't wait for the second book!

The start of the new academic year saw the library open to students again after a very long year of bubbles and how wonderful it was to welcome them back.




U14

After the tour, we completed another activity and went to lunch and it was delicious! We learnt how to look up information on Cambridge in general and learnt more about the different types of colleges there are. We prepared some questions and had a Q&A with 2nd and 3rd year students. It was really enlightening on the mindset of students in University, because there are very many misconceptions. After the Q&A, we said our thank you and left the college and headed back to school.

The trip to Cambridge was well organised and structured. The tour gave a good insight into the institutions at Cambridge, such as places like the library and how the books there could help with study. The college was built to engage students' minds and it was evident through the resources and activities. It was also able to give insight into the events Cambridge had to offer. This was helpful as students could relate their own hobbies to different society's events, for example the Music Society's Concert. One improvement I would make to the trip is access to the classrooms and inside of Cambridge. The research and QNA with the students at the college gave insight into life at Cambridge. The QNA was especially helpful by being able to see more specifically what life would be like on a day to day basis by current students. It was also well organised due to the fifteen minute prep held before as this ensured a vast amount of information to be covered. It was also helpful to get an inside perspective as they had a larger knowledge of what each of their specific courses entailed. The research project gave less insight on college life, but gave more advice on things such as costing funds and super curriculum, which was highly appreciated.

The Curwen Print Centre



The Curwen Print Centre was established as an educational fine art printmaking charity in the late 1990's by Master Printer Stanley Jones MBE and local entrepreneur and art lover, Sam Olper OBE. The Curwen Print Study Centre has established a centre of excellence in its field since its formation.

The centre is found in the middle of Cambridgeshire in the countryside. The studio is well equipped for workshops in

different photography techniques. The presses used were a Columbian Eagle (1837) and subsequent Albion models from the 1860's. All works of art in their own right and all working as well now as then.

The purpose of this visit was to learn about the different printing techniques that could be used to transfer and manipulate images, using photographs that we had taken throughout lockdown in 2020 and 2021.



We started by looking at the different printing process in the studio space and learning how we use them safely. Then we created at test strip to show different ways of creating indents, scratches and mark making and produced a printed example which gave us our first experience of using a real printing press.

Tate Modern

On the 21st October I visited the Tate Modern as part of my coursework. I went on this trip basically blind, only knowing that the Tate Modern was an art gallery. When arriving I found the building was not what I expected it to be. The use of the word 'Modern' made me think that the building would be much more modern than it was. In my opinion, it was much more dated than the surroundings around it. I didn't think it looked much like an art gallery despite not going to one before. I found that the architecture was more traditional, as I found it more old-fashioned and not as modern as I thought it would be. The location of the building was unusual. There were offices





and many restaurants surrounding the building, which I found surprising as it contrasts the subject of the building. From one side of the building however, you could see many of the skyscrapers across the river. I think this made the building seem more a part of London and gave a nice view compared to the restaurants and offices.

When entering the building and getting closer to the 'Turbine Hall' the first thing I saw was what I described to be 'weird balloon things floating around'. They gave a

sort of robotic, machinery feel and seemed to be part of a project perhaps. The colours and tones were very black and white and even neutral tones, with no specific colour standing out. When signing in, everything seemed to be in one place and I felt as if I didn't know where to look first. I had never been to a gallery like this before, so I was

unsure of where to go or what to expect when looking around the building.

We decided to go right first and work our way up, around and then down to the left. We started in what appeared to be the Blavatnik Building. The walls all seemed very old, almost as if they were going to fall down which is not what I expected. The first place we visited was where the Tanks were first stored from when the building was a power station.



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The building seemed very old and you could tell that it Year 7 English enjoyed a lesson learning about gave a mysterious feeling to the building itself. When poems to show their remembrance. looking throughout the Tate Modern, I found two different sculptures and pieces of work which I found Miss. A. Hawkes - HLTA English linked in with my projects of disguise. My photography project is currently 'disguise' which helps me link the pieces into my coursework and hopefully gives me inspiration within my own work to create sculptures like the ones I found.

The first one was called 'Untitled' created in the 90's by Peter Fischli and David Weiss. At first glance, the work just looks like stuff. There wasn't a particular thing, except it all looked like work things like building or decorating. After finding out more about the work, I found that all the things making this work were actually not just things, but made up of different materials to create an illusion of it all being real. This portrays disguise as at first glance everything looks real and just placed for the gallery when really it isn't even close to real.

The second piece I found which linked to disguise was called 'Plague Column #2' created in 2016 by Ciprian There is a prize for the first person in each year Muresan. At first glance, this looks just like an abstract sculpture, however looking closer, there are body parts embedded into the surface. This links with disguise because without paying attention to the actual work, will be given out in the New Year. you would not be able to see what the work actually is and all the things making the sculpture. The different body parts are the same colour and similar sizes which makes it difficult to see the full perspective.



The Twelve Days of Christmas

The song, "The Twelve Days of Christmas" is an English Christmas carol.

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics.

It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of the Church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember. To fit the number scheme, when you reach number 9, representing the Fruits of the Holy Ghost, the originator combined 6 to make 3, taking the 6 fruits that were similar: the fruit in each parenthesis is the that was not named separately.

There are actually Twelve Fruits of the Holy Ghost.

The "True Love" one hears in the song is not a smitten boy or girlfriend but Jesus Christ, because truly Love was born on Christmas Day. The partridge in the pear tree also represents Him because that bird is willing to sacrifice its life if necessary to protect its young by feigning injury to draw away predators.

The two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments



The three French hens stood for faith, hope, and love.

The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John.

The five golden rings represented the first five books of the Old Testament, which describe man's fall into sin and the great love of God in sending a Saviour.

The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit-----Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.

The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.

Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit----Charity, Joy, Peace, Patience [Forbearance], Goodness [Kindness], Mildness, Fidelity, Modesty, Continency [Chastity].

The ten lords a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.

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The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful Apostles.

The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in The Apostles' Creed.
