What does it mean to be Lasallian?

"To touch the hearts of your pupils and to inspire them with the Christian spirit is the greatest miracle you can perform."

Saint John Baptist de La Salle

To be Lasallian is to be fully immersed in the five principles of De La Salle; Faith in the Presence of God; Respect for all; Inclusiveness; Quality Education and Concern for the poor.

St. John Baptist de La Salle the Founder of the Brothers of the Christian Schools (1651-1719) was an Educational innovator and in 1950 proclaimed the universal Patron of all Teachers.

Our Lasallian School's unique education is marked by a distinctive spirit. This spirit is rooted in the Gospels of Jesus Christ and in the spirituality and educational philosophy of St. John Baptist de La Salle. We are part of a world-wide network of Lasallian Schools. Our district is made up of Great Britain, Ireland and Malta.

The Lasallian Educational Mission to give a human and Christian education to the young especially in schools with service of the poor as a priority in order to evangelize and catechize to promote peace and justice accomplished together as a "shared mission"

Shared Mission "The future of the Christian schools is no longer in the hands of the Brothers alone, but in the unified commitment of all who espouse its mission." "Today, the mission which the Church entrusted to the Institute is in the hands of the Brothers and their Colleagues. In fact, it is together and by association that we, Brothers and Colleagues, will fulfill the present-day mission of the schools."

In our School, we live out and concentrate on one of De La Salle's principles once a term by all departments and through the promotion of the Lasallian awards; where we put into practice our achievement in being Lasallian.

Faith in the Presence of God

Our Lasallian school nurtures belief in the living presence of God in our world. Faith in the presence of God calls all students into a deeper awareness of their saving relationship with a caring and loving God and to see the world through the "eyes of faith." This core principle is reflected through this Lasallian expression of faith: "Let us remember that we are in the Holy Presence of God."

Concern for the Poor and Social Justice

Our Lasallian school calls us to an awareness of the poor and victims of injustice and responds to their needs through programs of community service, advocacy, and justice education. This core principle is expressed through the Lasallian ideal: "Enter to Learn, Leave to Serve."

Respect for All Persons

Our Lasallian school engages in a concerted effort to respect the dignity of all persons. Respect-filled relationships are at the heart of Lasallian education and are a key expression of the acknowledgement of each other's identity as children of God. This core principle is reflected through the Lasallian expression of faith: "Live Jesus in our hearts... Forever."

Quality Education

Our Lasallian school provides an education that prepares students not only for college and career but also for life. This education advances the students' abilities to use their talents to critically examine the world in light of the message of the Gospels and to take greater responsibility for their own education. This core principle is expressed through the Lasallian ideal: "Teaching Minds and Touching Hearts."

Inclusive Community

Our Lasallian school is a united community where diversity is respected, where no one is left out, and where everyone finds a place. Individuals within the school community recognize and accept another's strengths and limitations. This core principle is expressed through the Lasallian ideal: "The Lasallian Family."



Brilliant Club

At De La Salle, we have been working over the past number of years with The Scholars Programme. These sessions are aimed at Year 9 students who we believe could succeed at a top UK university. This is the 4th cohort that I have been involved with and I am truly amazed at the calibre of work that students continue to produce.

The Brilliant Club as it is more locally known is a programme in that PhD tutors teach students on a range of topics. We have been very lucky this year to have worked with two tutors both of which have expressed their pleasure in teaching a group of talented enthusiastic individuals.



The spring cohort has recently completed their graduation celebrating their remarkable achievements. Students are marked using university grades and I am very pleased to announce that all 12 students completed the course to a high standard, with one of our students achieving a 1:1, and another 5 students each achieving a 2:1's. These are outstanding achievements for Year 9 students. I can see bright futures for all of the students who have completed the course.

Later this year the summer cohort will graduate and I know that I will be extolling the same sense of achievement and pride as previous cohorts. In the autumn term, we hope to visit Cambridge University to show students what opportunities their hard work and determination could provide.

Physical Health

Including cardio-vascular fitness, a healthy weight, strength, co-ordination and energy.



Mental Wellbeing

Including happiness, resilience, ability to tackle anxiety and stress, and improved mood through the release of 'feel good' endorphins.



Emotional and Social Wellbeing

Including feeling less lonely, more trusting, and improved communication and teamwork skills.

There is also growing evidence that being physically active **improves the brain** by stimulating the growth of neurones in the cerebral hippocampus (the part of the brain responsible for **learning** and **memory**). Young people's **ability to concentrate** has also been shown to improve after physical activity.



<u>Summer Book Review – The Railway Children by Edith</u> <u>Nesbitt</u>

I was going to begin by apologising for writing about something comforting to read — even escapist — but I feel we are all in need of comfort at the moment. And perhaps the three children in the story would empathise with the challenges facing many families right now. In fact, I know they would.

The Railway Children tells the story of a middle-class family whose lives change dramatically one evening when unexpected guests arrive. Nesbitt paints such a lovely picture of their lives in the first few pages, 'These three lucky children had everything they needed'. The description of servants, rocking horses and other wonderful toys paints a picture of a world which would have beyond the aspirations and dreams of most people in England in 1918. But it is written from Nesbitt's experience; it is unlike my grandad's experience (he was a miner, having started work aged 12) and my grandma's (she was sent into service upon leaving school in 1918). It is Nesbitt's truth, nonetheless, and the opening pages serve to make us feel greatly for the children when their idyllic existence is shattered.

Roberta, Phyllis and Peter help their mother to pack 'useful things', leaving behind everything comfortable and pleasant, and travel by train to a village in Yorkshire and to a very different way of life. Their mother has rented a farmhouse (yes - I did warn you that they are not typical of the time!) and gradually the children become aware that they are poor and aware of what that means. No National Health Service then; when their mother (I can't call her 'mum' it would be wrong!) falls ill, they rely on the kindness of the local doctor for treatment. They rely on the kindness of a friend they call 'the old gentleman' to help them provide the nourishing food they need. They make friends with the porter at their train station - Perks, played so brilliantly by Bernard Cribbins in the original film version, way back when, and he supports them as much as he is able, turning a blind eye to coal disappearing! Food scarcity, and fuel poverty too sounds familiar?

The children are always trying to help others; they organise a surprise birthday party for Perks because he never celebrates his own birthday, as all his income goes to keep his family. Their bravery and kindness avert a disaster, their sensitivity leads them to help a refugee who is struggling to be reunited with his family (sounds familiar?), and their sharp wits lead them to...... enough already! No spoilers on my watch!

But then something wonderful begins to happen, as their kindness towards others is reflected back to them and no spoilers; I've warned you already!

This is recommended for all ages, but my own children enjoyed this being read to them when at junior school then read it for themselves when they were a little older. The original film is wonderful, but a new version is coming to a cinema near you soon!

If you liked this, you will enjoy Anne of Green Gables by LM Montgomery and The Little Princess by Frances Hodgson Burnett. We have a great collection of classic fiction in the Ihub.

Have a wonderful summer, each and every one of you. And I hope the next few weeks are of full of opportunities for us all to make marvellous memories.


