If I carol in the nursing home and give all my money to charity but do not show love to my family; it profits me nothing.


If I attend the myriad of parties and sing in the choirs renditions of the Christmas hymns, but do not focus on those I love most; I have missed the point.

50th Celebration Mass

On 24th September we marked a very special Day in the life of De La Salle when we celebrated our 50th celebration Mass with Bishop Alan Williams SM and six concelebrating priests, 300 people made up of present and past staff and Students, two former head teachers including Brother Mark, our first head. Among the concelebrating priests were local clergy priests, who had been involved with the school through their ministry in the Parish, Fr Stephen Myers Episcopal Vicar for Education who read the Gospel and former pupil, Fr Damian Wade, who recently ordained and former teacher at DLS Basildon.

In his homily Bishop Alan (a former lasallian student himself) reflected on how our readings (Micah 6:6-8 Act Justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with your God, Psalm, Happy the man who has placed his trust in the Lord, Second reading: St Paul's Second letter to Timothy (as of his feast day reading 7th April) Gospel: The Beatitudes.) reflected the five core lasallian principles; Faith in the presence of God, Quality Education, Inclusiveness, concern for the poor and Social Justice and Respect for all.

It was also a chance to say thank you to Mr Nick Crouch for 40 years' service in Catholic Education. So in recognition, after a few words from Mr Paul Norris our Head, Bishop Alan presented Nick with a Papal Blessing from Pope Francis acknowledging his service.

After the Mass, we joined all together in the School Canteen for Lunch, live music and some reminiscing of stories, photos and great times. It was a great day and certainly one for the record books.

In September and October this year, the relics of St Bernadette journeyed on pilgrimage to England, Scotland, and Wales for the very first time.

In our diocese, the relics of St Bernadette came to the Cathedral Church of St Mary and St Helen (Brentwood Cathedral) on the 16th and 18th of October, they went to Our Lady of Lourdes parish church, Wanstead until 19th October.

A relic is a part of the physical remains of a saint after their death, or an object which has been in contact with their body. Relics help us feel close to a holy person while God shows his approval of relics by granting healing, and other graces.

Lourdes is probably most famous for being a place of miraculous physical healings. To date, 70 confirmed miracles have taken place, but thousands more are under investigation by the Lourdes Medical Bureau using the most up-to-date of scientific research, with those with and without faith investigating whether there is a medical explanation for a healing that has taken place.

The relics tour was a very special event that provided an opportunity for people of all ages and backgrounds to experience the special gifts and charisms of Lourdes, in a church or cathedral near them. The pandemic has meant that many have not had the opportunity to enrich their faith by going on pilgrimage in recent years.

Mrs Foley, one of our RE teachers and myself, led a 30 strong group of pupils to mark this event and went to visit the relics at the Cathedral. While we were there, there were small groups of young people from Grays Convent, Sacred Heart Upminster and the Brentwood Ursuline. Deacon Simon Conrad from the Cathedral introduced the proceedings, giving us a resume and introduction of the story of Lourdes and why it is important and then our young people had the opportunity to view and the relics. We also had the chance to pray for our community at De La Salle in front of our Lady of Lourdes statue.

It was a beautiful experience and the young people enjoyed the experience too.

Absence during term time for holiday will not be authorised unless there are exceptional circumstances. Any absence in term time must be applied for in advance. In addition, due to the importance of pupils settling into school at the commencement of the school year, Penalty Notices may also be issued if there have been at least six consecutive sessions of unauthorised absence during the first two weeks of September due to a term-time holiday. I must warn you that, if you do take your child out of school for this time, the absence will not be authorised and the local authority may issue a penalty notice to each parent of £120 for each child to be paid within 21 days, however if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, it is reduced to £60.


