How apt that, in the same week as World Book Day, a survey has shown that readers are nicer (yes, really!) because they are more inclined to feel and show empathy. There are lots of reasons to read, but that has to be my favourite! On World Book Day, I thought about how books have influenced me over the years, and felt that reading had helped improve my understanding of people from cultures and eras very different to my own.

I also thought about how things have changed – when my children were little, we had a stack of Enid Blyton and Roald Dahl cassettes in the car for long journeys and now my great nephews and nieces download audio books on their iPhones before travelling! I admit to having 'borrowed' a full set of Michael Morpurgo audio books when we travelled to Wales recently and, oh boy, did it make the journey fly! We needed a lot of tissues though.

My recommendation this term is Anne of Green Gables by L M Montgomery. One of a good selection of classic children's fiction in the school library which never lose their magic and are a great preparation for reading pre-20th century fiction in the Upper School.

A novel which allows you to accompany the heroine, Anne Shirley, on her journey into adulthood and thus to enjoy, empathise and laugh at her experiences.

Set on Prince Edward Island in the early 20th century, the story includes elements of escapism – life then was slow and people (on the whole) cared about each other – but includes ideas which will be all too familiar to the 21st century reader, such as friendship, success, popularity, romance and teenage angst.

The heroine is adopted by an elderly couple who are struggling to cope with their farm. Anne's placement was the result of an error – they had asked for a teenage boy – but they are enchanted by Anne by the first evening (as the reader is.) Anne is no Pollyanna; she has an uncontrollable need to be honest at all times – but her insatiable romanticism, wild imagination and infinite capacity for affection make her an appealing and unforgettable heroine. Recommended for: Years 7-8.

If you enjoy this, you might also enjoy Little Women by Louisa May Alcott and What Katy Did by Louisa May Alcott.

My interest in Extinction Rebellion started when I realised the state we have got ourselves into, corrupt politicians, companies ruining later generation's future for profit and the issue our society has with want over need. It is easy to feel powerless with large issues like this, but XR gave the people a voice through non-violent protest and civil disobedience. My first experience with the group was in October of 2019 when XR occupied Trafalgar Square. The experience was unlike what I expected, as the protest atmosphere felt more like a street party of environmentally conscious folk than the riots the media had me prepared for.





I was interested in capturing the true nature of the Extinction Rebellion movement to share it with as many people as possible, even if I could change just a few peoples minds about the group, it would be worth it. I photograph the faces of XR, to show the individual people who make up this movement and also try to show the excessive amount of force used against peaceful protesters, whether it be the thousands of arrests made at the October protests or the rows and rows of police that occupy the outskirts of every demonstration.

Taking photography as an option taught me how to better express what I want to put across through different ways of presenting my work, it also gave me more of an excuse to get out and follow my photography and to make it more than a hobby. I have

always been interested in street photography and the more gritty run and gun style of photography so focusing on the XR movement in my work just made sense. Once I finish De La Salle, I am going on to study film and media production, where many of the skills I have learnt will be transferable, although I still hope to continue photography alongside my studies. **Taylor V**





The Black Lives Matter Movement

On Monday the 25th of May 2020 the whole globe witnessed the tragic murder of George Floyd; a 46 year old black man who was killed at the hands of a white police officer employed by the Minneapolis police department. His death, being the final straw, sparked worldwide outrage and protests. The petition demanding justice for George Floyd is well on its way to 19.5 million signatures and has become the most signed petition on change.org. The global rage towards George Floyd's death has aided awareness for the Black Lives Matter Movement. But what exactly is the Black Lives Matter Movement?

Unavoidably, you have heard of the Black Lives Matter Movement in the weeks commencing George Floyd's death, for many however this being the first time hearing of the movement. The movement dates all the way back to 2013 and was founded in response to Trayvon Martin's death. What is now known as the Black Lives Matter Global Network began to organize in 2016 and started out as a chapter-based, member-led organization in search for local power. Recent reports state the hashtag associated with the movement has been used over 50 million times across social media platforms such as instagram and twitter. The aim of the anti-racism movement is to create 'a world free of anti-blackness, where every black person has the social, economic and political power to thrive'.

As of today, many are taking it upon themselves to show their support for the movement including large companies, celebrities and organisations. The Premier League is a prime example of awareness being spread as many players and officials take a knee to show their solidarity. Additionally, players' names were replaced with the line 'Black Lives Matter' on the back of their shirts, players had also been wearing the Black Lives Matter logo on their shirt sleeves which will now remain there for the rest of the season. Furthermore platforms such as Netflix and Youtube have decided to show their support by dedicating sections of their platform towards the education of black lives.

Additionally, a multitude of individuals took their solidarity to social media on Tuesday the 2nd of June by posting a black screen using the hashtag; #theshowmustbestopped and #blackouttuesday which was an initiative by two black women to use that day to 'take a beat for an honest, reflective, and productive conversation' about what actions need to be taken to support the black community. The hashtags now have over 24.7 million posts. Apple Music used this day to stream music made by black people only whilst many other brands such as Reddit and Twitter changed their logo to show accord with the movement. Others chose to show their unison through commercials like Nickelodeon, Nike and Adidas did, whereas others chose to show their unison through donations such as the UK rapper Stormzy, who is set to donate £10m to black British causes over the next 10 years.

The spread of awareness is all in the hope that one day we get to live in a world of racial equality, in a world where black people no longer suffer from institutionalised racism and systematic oppression, in the hope that one day we get to live in a world where your skin colour no longer defines you. In the hope that one day the world becomes a place where all black victims get the justice they deserve and in a world wherein we deserve to live, a world led by unity, love, peace and equality! #BlackLivesMatter


